<u>Trusts</u> <u>Tax and Legal Consequences</u>

Types of Trusts:

- 1. Bare Trust-property is vested in Trustees as nominees
- 2. Discretionary Trusts
- 3. Fixed Trust

A Trust can be created as an Inter-Vivos Trust – whilst the settlor is alive or as a Will Trust which is created on the Settlor's death.

<u>Trusts</u> <u>Tax and Legal Consequences</u>

Taxation of Discretionary Trusts:

Tax on Life of a Discretionary Trust:

- 1. Income Tax @ 20%- No Credits / USC /PRSI etc.
- 2. Surcharge at 20% on undistributed Trust Income 18 months to Distribute Income
- 3. 6% DTT Tax
- 4. 1% Annual DTT tax

<u>Trusts</u> <u>Tax and Legal Consequences</u>

Taxation of Discretionary Trusts:

6% DTT:

- 1. One off 6%
- 2. Can get 50% of 6% DTT refunded.
- 3. When does the 6% become payable:
- The later of:
- a) Date trust set up and assets put in Trust
- b) Date of death of disponer
- c) Date youngest principle object of Trust reaches 21.

NB: an application can be made for an exemption from the 6% - where the beneficiary because of a physical / mental / legal incapacity is incapable of mananging their affairs

Tax on Appointment out of a Trust:

- 1. CGT Trust Losses/CGT.CAT offset
- 2. CAT Beneficiaries NB Reliefs Available?

<u>Trusts</u> Tax and Legal Consequences

Taxation of Discretionary Trusts:

Payments to Children:

- Appointments made for Support/Education and Maintenance of Children – may be exempt from CAT if the child is a minor or under 25 in full-time education or permanently incapacitated.
- For the exemption to apply both parents have died and the expenditure who have been normal expenditure of the parents predeath.

<u>Trusts</u> Tax and Legal Consequences

<u>Taxation of Fixed Trusts:</u> Each beneficiary has a fixed entitlement is trust assets.

A life Interest Trust is the same as a Fixed Trust.

The tax implications of fixed trusts differ depending on the nature of the fixed trust used – the basic difference would be if

- a) The trustees can accumulate wealth in the fund OR
- b) The Trustees are compelled to pay out income to the beneficiaries

<u>Trusts</u> Tax and Legal Consequences

Taxation of Fixed Trusts:

Power to Accumulate Wealth:

When the trustees have the power to accumulate wealth the trust is deemed to be a Discretionary Trust for CAT and IT purposes Sec 2(1) CATCA2003.

The only difference between this trust and a Discretionary Trust is the trustees do not have the power to amend the trust.

<u>Trusts</u> Tax and Legal Consequences

Taxation of Fixed Trusts:

No Power to Accumulate Wealth:

Revenue view is that the child is deemed to inherit an interest in possession on the death of the parent.

The inheritance is taxed as a life interest. Lets assume the assets will be appointed to the child at 25. If the child was 18 at the parents date of death then = the period certain is 7 years and then apply the life interest rules per Schedule 1 Para 1, Sub Para 6 CATCA2003

<u>Trusts</u> Tax and Legal Consequences

Taxation of Fixed Trusts:

No Power to Accumulate Wealth:

E.G Child is 18. Dad dies and places 1m commercial property into a Fixed Trust to be paid to child on his $25^{\rm th}$ Birthday. Property will have a Market Value in 7 years of 1.2m

CAT today – 1m x life interest factor – 7 years => 1m x .3770 = 377000-class A -335000 = 42000 tax 33%

Inheritance in 7 years time = 1.2m and class threshold is used up.

<u>Trusts</u> Tax and Legal Consequences

Taxation of Fixed Trusts:

No Power to Accumulate Wealth:

The trustees are assessed to IT and CGT for the life of trust, Child is assessed to IT but will get a credit for tax paid by Trustees.

Appointment from the Trust at 25 years of age – will give rise to CGT $\,$
